

THE BEGINNING OF YCAP: An Interview with a Founder, Ted Lopuszynski

Ted Lopuszynski first learned about community action programs in the mid-1970's, when he worked for the Salem School District and was in charge of federal projects. He worked closely with the Mid-Willamette Valley Community Action Agency (MWVAA) during that time, and the agency served Yamhill County through government food distribution and information and

referral services. He was also aware of the Washington County Community Action Program, which was operated by the county. During his early years as Yamhill County commissioner, Ted felt the need for something similar in Yamhill County, so when the area become eligible by population (greater than 50,000 citizens) he opted to help form a private, non-profit, community action organization to serve Yamhill County citizens specifically.

On December 5th, 1979 (under Ted's direction) the Board of Commissioners formed Community Action Agency for Yamhill County (later called YCAP), to be located in McMinnville. They also established an Interim Board of Directors for the newly formed Community Action Program and held their first board meeting on December 13, 1979. In early 1980, by-laws for the program were enacted and YCAP opened it's doors at 341 North Baker Street.

YCAP's First Year in Action: 1980

Gleaners (formerly affiliated with MWVAA) moved under YCAP with four gleaning groups in Yamhill County, and YCAP was designated as Regional Coordinating Agency for Oregon Food Share, the statewide food distribution network. By late 1980, YCAP had established the Weatherization Program and the foundation for the Low Income Energy Assistance Programs, both funded by the U.S. Department of Energy.

During that first year, Gleaners distributed 12,443 pounds of fresh produce, the YCAP Food Bank distributed 21,324 pounds of food and the YCAP Weatherization Program completed 29 homes in Yamhill County. The YCAP Youth Education and Employment Program began in 1981 and worked with 204 clients and 67 potential high school dropouts that same year.

THE BIG MOVE: by former Executive Director, Lee Means

Was it really only seven years? We accomplished so much together from June 2007 to June 2014, as we moved into a new era in the midst of the "Great Recession". YCAP programs had outgrown the building leased from the county located on 2nd Street in McMinnville; so, the Board had started the early planning stages of a multimillion dollar capital campaign to build a new home- a real challenge for a small agency in a small county!

Fortunately, YCAP had a solid reputation, extensive community support, and a strong group of staff and volunteers. County Commissioner and former Board Chair, Mary Stern, pulled together a small but powerful cadre to lead the capital campaign. Board

Finance Director, Mark Davis, oversaw the building budget, and with the help of Waldo Farnham and Lee Vasquez, the construction of the building. With the recruitment of a grant writer, we were well on our way!

Community members really stepped up to help YCAP move into the future. They served on committees, held campaign meetings, recruited other volunteers and secured pledges to support fundraising for the new building. Staff took on campaign duties in addition to their regular jobs. In four short years, we raised the money, built the new structure and moved into our new home. It was the most amazing collaboration of volunteers, staff, and community I have ever experienced!
