


## **SUCCESS STORIES**

Our drop-in center in Newberg welcomes an average of 375 youth every week. It is a safe and welcoming place to hang out with friends, play games, take life skills classes, be mentored by caring adults and escape the turmoil of their daily lives.

YCAP's Harvest2Home program piloted new mobile food distribution starting in June 2015, taking fresh produce, recipes, nutrition information, and vegetable starts to migrant vineyard workers. The partnership included ¡Salud!, the Yamhill County OSU Extension office, and interns from the Linfield College Center for the NW.

The Harvest House family shelter exterior was fully remodeled thanks to a partnership with the Home Builders Foundation and donations from local contractors. Up to four families or more individuals can spend 1-4 months there to get stabilized as YCAP helps them find longer-term housing.

## FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR **Jeff Sargent**

YCAP serves Yamhill County as a Community Action Agency, among 18 in Oregon and over 1,000 nationally. Our mission is to advocate for and assist persons toward self-sufficiency. We help low-income persons and families who want a better future through our four primary programs: Client Services & Housing, Energy Services, the regional Food Bank, and Youth Outreach. We address homelessness issues, including leading a county-wide homeless count. We also provide assistance to seniors, the disabled, and veterans. Our Food Bank supplies over 30 partner pantries and community meal sites. In June 2015 Executive Director Lee Means retired after eight years, leading the fundraising and construction of the new Main Campus in McMinnville.

## MAKING A DIFFERENCE

## **Client Services & Housing**

Our case managers work with people in difficulty to review options, find resources and create individualized selfsufficiency solutions to help them recover. We direct them to YCAP services or to our local partners. We also have a Direct Client Assistance Fund for work-related needs. transportation, education, or health care costs.

## **Energy Services**

This program includes: energy education, financial assistance for energy costs, home energy audits, minor home repairs to reduce heat waste, base load reduction, compact fluorescent lights, low-flow shower heads, and heating system, insulation, door and window upgrades to improve energy efficiency. Most of these services are funded by federal grants and utilities.

#### **Food Bank**

1.3 million pounds of food went to 30 partner pantries and community meal sites, including 366,559 pounds of fresh produce. Our Friday Family Food program provided nutritious weekend food to low income families at two elementary schools, and fresh food was delivered to the McMinnville Senior Center during the summer.

#### **Youth Outreach**

Youth Outreach supports at-risk youth ages 11-21 throughout Yamhill County by creating positive youth development, funded by public and private partnerships. We offer services such as case management, support/ skills groups, youth leadership development, street youth outreach, an after school drop-in center, and an emergency youth shelter and transitional living program.
