

POINT IN TIME COUNT: #EveryoneCountsYamhill

Conducted on January 30th, 2019, YCAP Client Services and Housing Department completed another successful Point In Time (PIT) Homeless Count for Yamhill County. In providing a snapshot of homelessness year to year, the Homeless Count is a vital tool for understanding homelessness locally, implementing more effective programming & service delivery, and applying for funds to obtain more resources to use here in our county. Fifty three community volunteers and 25 YCAP staff/interns participated – some on street teams canvassing each community

in search of persons living unsheltered, while others worked in 13 Drop-in Sites around our county providing a warm space, supplies, and a meal. Additionally, community partners including school districts, social services agencies, and shelter personnel across the County surveyed homeless individuals, while many organizations (including businesses, churches, and Providence Hospital) collected survival supplies for the event itself. Private donors contributed funds for additional supplies, and First Transit once again offered a free transit day county wide. #EveryoneCountsYamhill!



WINGS & WAVES FEEDS HOPE

In the month of November Wings and Waves Waterpark hosted a phenomenal Food Drive for the YCAP Food Bank as a part of the Feed Hope campaign. The Wings and Waves team created an admissions discount for qualifying donations and shared the event on their social media to help promote participation from their patrons. Their efforts and dedication to help those in need in Yamhill County ended with an impactful 5,947 pounds of donated non-perishable items. This donation provided 4,955 meals to families in need. Thank you Wings and Waves for your dedication to the community!

CLIENT SERVICES: Counting Veterans in Yamhill County

In partnership with the McMinnville American Legion Women’s Auxiliary Club, the YCAP Client Services and Housing Department was able to secure a special Veteran site for the January 30th 2019 Point In Time Homeless Count. This site operated from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm and provided a full homemade meal, including turkey dinner, mashed potatoes, rolls, green beans and chocolate cake for veterans experiencing homelessness. The Legion’s Women’s Auxiliary group assembled backpacks full of essentials including hygiene items, cold weather gear, and first aid supplies to give to each Veteran that attended. Also available were survival supplies and a barber who provided haircuts to several veterans.

Part of the supportive services gathered together at the American Legion were Veteran service providers assembled there to make easy access on-site service connections with Veterans. These providers included the VA, Housing Authority, Veteran Service Officer and Veteran Services Outreach worker, WorkSource Veteran Representative, and YCAP’s Veteran Case Manager. Working with these providers, Veterans could sign up for housing opportunities, explore

their access to VA benefits, and make an appointment for ongoing employment supports. The veteran pictured to the right was able to connect to Worksource and discuss potential employment opportunities.

In addition to the regular Homeless Count survey form used with all homeless individuals, volunteers across Yamhill County also collected the contact information of Veterans who were encountered during the Count. Veterans identified in the Count will be contacted for housing and shelter services by YCAP’s Veteran Case Manager in the weeks following the Homeless Count. Many thanks to the McMinnville American Legion and all the Veteran service providers for making sure every Veteran counts! Their site was successful in providing a warm and welcoming space for Veterans experiencing homelessness.

ENERGY & WEATHERIZATION: Bringing warmth to those in need

The Energy and Weatherization team works diligently to meet every need that arises. In the cold of winter, the urgency is that much greater when we receive phone calls for Energy and Weatherization assistance.

In December a single parent came up via our wait list as the next to be contacted by our team. They shared that their mobile home had a leaky roof and no reliable source of heat. They had received energy assistance previously and had progressed to crisis payments.

The team assessed the situation and found that the Weatherization program could service the home by providing air sealing, mechanical ventilation as well as added floor and ceiling insulation. Most importantly, Weatherization installed a new roof package and high energy efficient heat pump just in time for the cold snap! During the process of this weatherization support, the client secured new employment, and they are very happy with the result!



This house is now a place I am happy to come home to, it is not a source of stress and worry. It will, however, take me a while to get used to being warm this winter.



FOOD BANK: Offering assistance to Sheridan FCI Employees

In January the warden of the local Sheridan Federal Prison reached out to YCAP around the time his employees faced their first missed paycheck. He was concerned about his employees being able to provide food to their families as they faced challenges during the government shut down and wanted to let them know what programs may be available. The YCAP Food Bank discussed the options available and responded by coordinating a delivery of food items to help the employees and their families during their time of hardship.

YCAP Food Bank Programs and Logistics Coordinator, Dave Rucker, drove the delivery truck to a location near the prison. The Food Bank truck was filled with pallets of packaged non-perishable items and fresh produce such as potatoes, onions, carrots, pears, apples and oranges. A team of Sheridan FCI employees waited for Dave's arrival



with their four large pick-up trucks. One employee brought his young son, who was eager to help get the boxes in the trucks and served as a huge help to the team. Brian, an FCI employee, shared the impact this delivery would have for his fellow employees and their families:



We've been worried, concerned, trying to figure out how to buy certain foods, pay rent, and purchase gas. This resource is a plus – now we can focus on the other problems. We have 125 families standing by for this specific delivery. A lot of them have children, and a lot of them have newborns. Our feelings right now are joyous, this is a relief for us.



YCAP was honored to be able to support the employees of Sheridan FCI during their time of need. We hope this time of hardship has passed given the reopening of the government, but we are always here to help if needed.



YOUTH SERVICES: Youth Outreach is Meeting Needs

At-risk youth, particularly runaway and homeless teens, benefit from programs that meet immediate needs first, and then help address other aspects of their lives.

At Youth Outreach, we work with young people in a number of ways: daily street outreach making meaningful, often critical connections; safety through emergency shelter and transitional living programs; practical life skills, peer support groups, and behavioral health counseling; targeted assessments and supportive wraparound case planning and implementation; educational and job readiness assistance in locating and keeping employment; and enrichment activities that help foster resiliency during tough times, while building permanent connections to the community.

All of this - coupled with youth empowerment through leadership opportunities - are just a few of our free services to young people in our county.

Because frankly, we believe youth homelessness is unacceptable. Don't you?
