
2016 Needs Assessment Report

There were **738** Households counted during the 2016 Point-In-Time Homeless Count. **495** chose to fill out at least a portion of the Needs Assessment located on the back of the survey. The chart below shows the breakdown of the communities that the forms originated from.




In 2015 458 households filled out the Needs Assessment portion of the survey. The breakdown was:

Pregnancy

14 households reported having a pregnant member in their home and 3 households reported that they were unsure. Of the fourteen households, nine gave an age of the mother with the average age being
26. The three households that were unsure if they had a pregnant member were located in
McMinnville, Newberg, and Sheridan. Nine households shared their due date on the form. This allowed us to calculate that 5.3 months was the average. One household was unsure of their due date.

Employment

108 Households, out of 495, identified as having an adult household member employed. Some households did not report the status of their employment. **56** report that they are working full-time, **32** part-time, **4** temp/seasonal job, **14** unemployment, and **1** self-employed. Comments from participants who may or may not be working include: That unemployment ran out, they receive alimony, help girlfriend delivery papers, work odd jobs, Step-dad just received job, Aunt is employed, poor health impacts work options, wife works –husband does not, work construction, work one day a week, and retired CAN.

86 households reported that they were unable to work. The assessment asked for a reason that the household member could not work. There were no standard answers and various terminologies were used for the same issues. Answers from the forms were placed into ten categories for ease of reporting.

The largest reason that forms gave for not working was Disability/Medical which was marked by 18 households. McMinnville and Sheridan were the two communities who reported the highest numbers in this category.

Recovery/Addiction was the second most given reason for not working. The county total was 16 households who reported some sort of recovery or addiction issue as why they were not working. McMinnville and Yamhill were the two communities that reported the highest numbers in this category.

Mental Health and Criminal Issues tied for the third most given reason for households not working. Both categories came in with 12 each for the county. For Mental health, McMinnville reported the highest number. Newberg and Sheridan also reported higher mental health numbers. For Criminal issues almost every community reported at least one household not working because of this factor. McMinnville had the highest response with 9.

In Yamhill County 10 people responded that they were applying for Social Security of some sort and were unable to work. McMinnville and Newberg reported the highest numbers in this category.

Physical Health issues and School were the next category that tied with 9 households reporting this as the reasons they are not working in each community. McMinnville and Sheridan were the two highest responders for Physical Health being a barrier to employment. The School category refers to the inability to work based on being enrolled in schooling. Dayton scored the highest in this category with McMinnville coming in second.

Childcare was a barrier for 5 households in regard to employment. Newberg recorded 2 forms with this marked and Amity, Dundee and McMinnville each had 1 form that responded that childcare was a barrier to employment.

Public Assistance

Households were asked if anyone in their family had received public assistance in the last thirty days. **298** households identified as having received assistance out of the 495 forms received that were filled out.


Food

In 2015 245 Households answered the question if they had visited a food pantry, soup kitchen or meal site in the last thirty days. 114 responded that they visit a Food Pantry, 79 had visited a Soup Kitchen and 52 visited a Meal Site.

211

Individuals filling out the forms were asked if they had ever called 211. There were follow-up questions based on their answer of Yes or No that helped to clarify their experience with 211.

Out of the 495 forms filled In Yamhill County:

- **136 (27%)** forms identified that they had called 211 at some point in the past.
- **73 (15%)** forms asked what is 211?
- **62 (13%)** forms said that they had heard of 211, but had never called
- **57 (12%)** forms said they were connected to services when they called 211

- 38 (8%) forms said they had found 211 helpful, but it did not meet their needs
- **37(7%)** forms said they had called 211, but not found it helpful
- **3 (.61%)** forms said that they refused to call 211




